A MESSAGE FROM Father Wince

DEAR PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS,

Every weekend, and on other special feasts, we recite a Profession of Faith at Mass, often using the Nicene Creed. Like many people, when I say the words of that creed, I often take them for granted. However, in my more lucid moments (and I have them now and then) I remind myself how some of the sentences in that Profession of Faith were painstakingly hammered out. I am also conscious that the creed could have looked very different if the discussions at certain Church councils proceeded in other directions. Let me provide us with a little history to explain what I mean.

After Emperor Constantine's Edict of Toleration in 313 A.D., it was no longer illegal to be a Christian. The Church was able to emerge from the shadows -- "out of the catacombs" as they say. When they did so, one of the first things Christian leaders noticed was the fact that they often used similar words to articulate the mystery of Jesus, but that these words frequently had different meanings. For example, the term "Son of God" had a variety of definitions. Christian theologians often turned to New Testament passages and to the terminology of Greek philosophy attempting to sort it all out. Here are some of the theories and interpretations of the phrase "Son of God" which emerged during the fourth and fifth centuries.

Some Christian thinkers contended that Jesus was born a human being, just like everyone else, and at a certain point was "adopted" by God the Father, either at Jesus's baptism in the Jordan or at some other time. It was at that moment, whenever it was, he became the Son of God (Adoptionism). Others taught that the Son of God was always divine, but that he was not truly human, only appearing to be so in the person of Jesus of Nazareth (Docetism). Still others contended that Jesus had only one nature, a sort of a hybrid of a human and divine nature (Monophysitism). Another, very popular theology, taught that the Son of God, who became Jesus, was human and divine, but he was not divine in the same way that God the Father was divine (Arianism). Finally, another school of thought believed that the Son of God was eternally God as much as the Father was, and when the Son became human he both had and maintained two distinct natures - one divine and one human with neither one absorbing the other (Hypostatic Union).

Each of the above schools of thought made a great deal of sense to its adherents, and each found ways to logically substantiate their ideas. On occasion some of the leaders of these various theories intentionally sought support from



Christian emperors in Constantinople in order to gain leverage over other theologians who disagreed with them. This often complicated things even more.

For well over a century these arguments went back and forth, hotly debated at various gatherings of ecclesiastical leaders and often among rank-and-file Christians as well. So, with all these ideas swirling around how did our religion arrive at something approaching consensus about Jesus, his nature and his relationship with the Father and the Holy Spirit?

At the risk of sounding trite, the Church's leaders used a method which was utilized several centuries later by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's fictional detective, Sherlock Holmes. Holmes claimed that he often could solve crimes by removing every other possible solution, and whatever remained must be the truth, improbable as it may have seemed.

Although not everyone was pleased with the conclusions of the various councils, after excluding what most of the Christian leaders and the faithful did not believe, the only theory left standing regarding the nature of Jesus as the Son of God, was Hypostatic Union. The other teachings were condemned as heretical.

With all of this in mind, I hope that many of us would not take the Nicene Creed for granted when we recite it at Mass. It took a significant amount of time, blood, toil, tears, and sweat to conjure up the words we use each week to express our common faith in the mystery of God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

A PASTORAL Reflection

NOTICED, NAMED, AND KNOWN

At various times throughout the year, I have the opportunity to speak with parish leaders from around the country. Whether gathered at conferences or special diocesan meetings, we explore what it means to be a vibrant and welcoming community in the world today. Often I will ask them to reflect on these two questions: What do you want from your parishioners? And, what do you want for your parishioners?

Personally, I have one answer for both of those questions... I want us to intentionally take several steps forward in getting to know each other.

Vibrant parishes know each other. Christians know each other.

In *The Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis invites to "move forward, boldly take the initiative, go out to others, seek those who have fallen away, stand at the crossroads and welcome the outcast (24)."

Because we are all interconnected through our common baptism, we each have a role in each other's story. And because of that, Christ's presence is revealed to us in many different ways. If we are open to it, we each come to know Jesus more intimately because of the interactions we have with each other.

We are companions on a journey together. We support each other, we need each other. So why not take the steps forward to deepen our understanding and appreciation of each other?

Here are three destinations on our roadmap together: being noticed, being named, and being known.

I first heard about this approach to parish life in a presentation delivered by Dr. Josh Packard, executive director of Springtide Research Institute. He mentions that the younger generations are moved from a state of loneliness to that of belonging as we grow in relationship with one another. His words made me consider the impact this can have on us as a faith community.

As a parish family, we come together for worship, community, catechesis, and acts of charity. We abandon isolation and we celebrate inclusion. As we strive to become a more welcoming and evangelizing parish, I invite you to journey with me as we progress to our three destinations:

Noticed: If you come to the parish and see a familiar face, simply smile. If you see a parishioner out in the neighborhood, say a quick hello. In a world that seems increasingly cold and anonymous, the simple act of acknowledging another is capable of warming one's heart and making a difference in their day. Recognizing each other is recognizing Christ's presence in the world.

Named: Names are important. Not only do names identify us, they say so much about who we are and where we come from. Few things are as personal to us as our name. Share yours. Ask others. As we read in Isaiah 43: God calls us by name. Let us model this in our interactions with each other.

Known: After we have noticed and named each other, consider taking a step in getting to know each other a little more. Ask open-ended questions. Respect boundaries. Don't cut them off in order to tell your own story. So rarely are people asking us to share our stories. Our faith relies on us sharing the ways in which we encounter the Risen Christ. And our faith demands that we share the Good News in our daily lives.

What do I want *for/from* our parishioners? For us to be bold in the way we take the step forward in getting to notice, name, and know each other.

As Christians, we have a responsibility for each other... so, we might as well take the time to get to know each other.

THE NAVIGATING DIVORCE MINISTRY

Most current sociological studies indicate that the plethora of issues debilitating our society is a product of "the breakdown of the family." Whether or not the above is an accurate statement may initiate argumentation from many opinions and sources.

In the SMOL-OLL Navigating Divorce Ministry our confidential, cost-free, weekly small group discussions are focused on individual rather than global concerns. Simply stated, we try to bring genuine healing from the tragedy of divorce (and its consequences) into the life of each member. Under the guidance of The Holy Spirit, we openly share those very real and very hurtful issues which vitiate a thorough healing from our divorce experience. We have entered our third year and have held nearly 150 consecutive sessions. These 1 hour sessions (each **Sunday morning from 9:15- 10:15 AM** in the parish office) are not a Bible study nor a prayer group per se. They consist of women and men who are determined to move forward within a new life freed from the residual effects of divorce. Consequently, a typical session will run the proverbial gamut of emotions. We feel compelled to confidentially express our anger, disbelief, hatred, and even lethargy all under the umbrella of the various stages of grief.

SOUP KITCHEN & SACK MEAL PROGRAM

Volunteers are needed to **MAKE SACK MEALS** and to help with service on Wednesday nights. To make this a success consistently each week, we need 80 individuals/families to commit to donating at least once a month.

Each sack meal should contain:

- 2 lunch meat sandwiches with no condiments, cheese is optional but a nice addition
- 2 cheese sticks
- 1 bag of chips (or similar)
- 1 piece of soft fruit (for example, orange, banana, grapes)
- Dessert (cookies or candy bar)
- Beverage (juice box, can of soda, or 8 oz water bottle/sports drink)
- Napkin

Please pack each meal in a gallon-sized plastic bag (like Ziploc). Or please use a plastic grocery bag.

GROWING IN FAITH Together

INTRODUCING THE "STRENGTHS AND SPIRITUAL GIFTS FOR THE JOURNEY" PROGRAM

This four-week program allows an in-depth exploration of the strengths that participants can grow from their God-given talents, the spiritual gifts that reflect those strengths, and how they can call upon their strengths and gifts to become disciples of Christ. Open to all adult parishioners, the program is based on Gallup's StrengthsFinder 1.0 Assessment [™] and the book *Living Your Strengths (Catholic Edition)*, as well as an established online spiritual gifts assessment program.

Participants will take an assessment tool developed by Gallup, Inc. that will identify and explore their God-given talents, strategies for developing their talents into strengths, and ways in which their top strengths can work together on an individual and group basis. Participants will also take an established on-line assessment that allows them to discover their spiritual gifts. Together these assessments will be used to explore how each participant can draw upon his or her God-given talents, strengths and spiritual gifts to become a disciple of Christ.

The revised *Strengths For The Journey* program will be conducted in four small group sessions lasting approximately 2 hours each. Each session will involve prayer, reflection about relevant passages from Scripture, and active sharing of each participant's strengths and spiritual gifts assessment results. Led by trained facilitators, the small group discussions will be focused on how participants can utilize their strengths and spiritual gifts to enrich their faith life and improve their effectiveness in daily life. At the conclusion of the program, participants will be asked to make a specific commitment to use their God-given talents, strengths and spiritual gifts at Saint Mary's and Our Lady of Lourdes or elsewhere on their journey to become disciples of Christ.

Participants will be supplied all program materials during the first session. Each participant will need to purchase a copy of Living Your Strengths: Discover Your God-Given Talents and Inspire Your Community prior to start of the program with the Parish Office. Before June 30 -there will be a 45minute pre workshop assignment to complete before the July 24 session. (Directions for the pre work assignment will be included with the book.) There is a \$20 book fee. The book contains the code for Gallup's assessment tool as well as other resources for our discussions. The course will also use an online spiritual gifts assessment tool that is free; the link to this assessment will be provided at the workshop.


