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# A MESSAGE FROM Father Vince

## DEAR PARISHIONERS,

I think it may be a matter either of genius or of divine providence that the Catholic Church begins November with two important celebrations - All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day. I say this because during November, especially in the northern hemisphere, the change in seasons becomes rather obvious. The daylight hours grow noticeably shorter, the nights colder, and the brilliantly colored leaves abandon their branches. These changes in the natural world make many of us consider the fact that all good things, including life itself – at least as far as this life is concerned – come to an end. So, we Catholics gather in church on the first two days of November to recall our connections with those who have passed from this life to the next. We also decorate the side altars of our church with ofrendas to remind ourselves of our family members and friends who graced our lives while they were with us, and we hold them in prayer in a special way during the weeks of November.

Since November seems to be a month when we consider both the inevitability of death and the promise of eternal life we enjoy because of our relationship with Jesus, it seemed like a good idea to say a few words about how our faith tradition assists us when someone we love passes away. I especially want to highlight the beauty and the hope our Church's rites afford us during a time of loss.

One of the things I believe I have learned in over forty-seven years of priesthood and after presiding at over a thousand funerals is the importance of trusting in our rituals. I believe that they can assist us and carry us through the difficult times which are part of living through the loss of a family member or friend. I know this from my own experience when my sister and my parents died. In those sad moments our Catholic rituals helped guide my family and me through the stormy seas of grief.

I say it is important to trust our rituals because the death of a loved one frequently provokes a sense of emotional disequilibrium in those who are left behind. Even if the passing of someone has been expected, that person's death impacts those closest to the deceased in ways they may not be conscious of at the time. When planning a funeral they may wish to recreate the proverbial wheel because they are not certain of what to do, because of something they witnessed at another funeral, or more frequently because they are not Catholics or are not active Catholics and do not have a connection with our sacramental life. All of this is understandable, but I believe that trusting in what our Catholic tradition offers makes things easier, and it also allows all involved to be carried someplace special as they live through loss and grief -- which is precisely what our rituals are designed to do.

Although the Church offers us several opportunities for prayer after the death of a believer, it especially envisions three separate services or "stations" – the wake, the funeral Mass, and the internment. I wish to focus on the funeral Mass because it is the

most important of the three. I also want to say a few words about what a funeral Mass is and what it is not.

The emphasis of the funeral Mass is placed on Jesus's victory over death in which believers find hope far more than it is on the person who died. It is not so much a celebration of the life of the deceased or a memorial service for the person who has passed away as it is a memorial of the death and resurrection of Jesus by whom we are saved. The Order of Christian Funerals #129 phrases it this way. "At the funeral liturgy the community gathers with the family and the friends of the deceased to give praise and thanks to God for Christ's victory over sin and death, to commend the deceased to God's tender mercy and compassion, and to seek strength in the proclamation of the pascal mystery."

All that having been said, I am fully aware that there is no such thing as a generic funeral. People gather in God's house for a funeral liturgy because one of his children has died. Each deceased person has a specific history, and that person's life was intertwined with the lives of others. Whether the person for whom we celebrate the funeral Mass is a centenarian or a child, whether the person was a faithful Catholic or someone who rarely entered a church, whether the person had the reputation of being a living saint or had a reputation that was less than stellar we gather in church to pray for this specific individual, asking for God to have mercy on the soul of the departed and to give comfort to those left behind. If these are some of the purposes of the funeral Mass, I think we should trust it to do what it is designed to do.

As we journey through November, beginning with All Saints' and All Souls' days, I hope we all take time to focus on all that our faith offers us as we consider the terminal nature of life and the promise of heaven which comes to us because of that faith. I likewise hope during a time of loss and grief we will trust in our Church's rituals to assist us as they are meant to do.










### **NOVEMBER: THE MONTH OF ALL THE FAITHFUL DEPARTED**

### **SOUP KITCHEN & SACK MEAL PROGRAM**

### Each sack meal should contain:

- Dessert (cookies or candy bar)
- Beverage (juice box, can of soda, or 8 oz water bottle/sports drink)

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# (PRACTICING) CATHOLIC

### What Remains

When my grandfather died, my parents, siblings, and I were left with the question: what's to become of the house?

Anyone who has inherited property knows that it's not simply a matter of assuming ownership of a plot of land upon which sits four walls and a roof. Those four walls and a roof usually contain memories and objects — an enormous volume of both, in the case of my grandfather. When they're left to you, you have to sift through them, the memories and the objects, and with each one you have to think: *Is it worth it? Do I keep it? Will I need it?* 

And slowly, painfully, you disassemble the physical existence of the person who lived here. You accept, with a pang, that most of it must be given away or discarded. You cry when you bag up the clothes to take to Goodwill. You can't even bear to look when they break the piano into a hundred pieces and throw it in a dumpster, realizing that no one wants or has a use for something that was once so precious.

But when you come upon a rosary that was used so many times it has begun to fall apart, you don't even think twice before keeping it, and not because you need the rosary. You need what it means. You need what it reminds you of.

When all is said and done, each of us will be called before our master to settle accounts, just as my grandfather was.

"Where are the gifts I gave you? What remains of the fortune to which I entrusted you?" he will ask us. "What have you done with the peace? What have you done with the love? What have you done with the mercy?"

# Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

## **Question:**

If it isn't only for people who are dying, when should someone receive the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick?

### **Answer:**

One of the unfortunate realities in the Church today is that so few people understand the meaning and value of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, largely because so many people still mistakenly think of this sacrament as "Last Rites" or "Extreme Unction."

In his life and ministry, Jesus healed the sick. In this sacrament, the Church continues the healing mission of Jesus and, in hope, prays that God will grant healing to the person who is suffering. But even if there is no physical healing, the sacrament offers spiritual healing through the Holy Spirit's gifts of peace and courage. And so, anyone who is living with serious illness (including emotional or psychological illness) and the elderly are encouraged to celebrate this sacrament when it is needed.

The ritual for Anointing of the Sick does also include special prayers and blessings for those who are facing death, including viaticum (communion given to the dying, trusting that the Lord Jesus will be their companion along the way, as they make their final journey).



### THE COMMUNITY OF SANT'EGIDIO

The Community of Sant'Egidio is a movement of lay people dedicated to communicating and living out the Gospel through prayer, solidarity with the poor and service to peace. It was born among high school students in Rome in 1968, in the period following the Second Vatican Council and today is present in Rome, the rest of Italy, and in seventy other countries throughout the world.
